October Mission of the Month



Green Team Ministries

Here is a great idea for when your pumpkins have served the purpose of being a jack-o-lantern. You can recycle them in a good way by taking them to a Pumpkin Smash event. Composting them this way avoids landfill greenhouse gas emissions and, because pumpkins are actually 90% water, they help to produce a useful, nutrient-dense soil addition. So go to the Village Green Community Garden Plots in Glen Ellyn, 130 S. Lambert Rd next to the Village Green Baptist Church, where God's Garden is located. This is sponsored by the Glen Ellyn Park District on Saturday, November 4, 9 a.m. – 11 a.m. This is an easy way to do something good for our environment!

Another wonderful, meaningful action you can take to help our environment is to refuse straws when you go to restaurants and drive through eateries. They aren't recyclable and jam up the recycling process machines. You can take your own reusable water bottle and show others that you are concerned about the environment.
